

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FOREWORD

Charlotte Mae Blankenkaker Lovett had the Family Bibles of Benjamin Blankenkaker and his son, Dr. Luther Alexander Blankenkaker, the father of Dr. Leslie Alexander Blankenkaker, who was Charlotte's father. She wrote in the margin of Benjamin's Bible that he was son of Samuel born 1754.

When Col. Robert Jobson published his book on records of Jeffersontown, he noted that Samuel and Benjamin were members of the old Jeffersontown Lutheran Church. Calling the church to ask about the early records, the secretary referred me to the microfilm that the Jeffersontown and Southeastern Jefferson County Historical Society had filmed. Both The Filson Club and the University of Louisville Archives were to have received copies, but had not. Tracking down the film by calling a former Society President, Mrs. Ira (Marian) White, she remembered that Mrs. Tom (Adena) Offutt had stored the film at her home. Due to their kindness, I borrowed the film, and my friend, Betty Elswick, lent her microfilm reader to me, without which this would not have been transcribed.

To my great surprise, instead of a few listings of Samuel and Benjamin, the whole record contained information concerning them and their descendants along with the descendants of the first early German settlement of Jefferson County, many from the Germanna settlement of Virginia. Indeed Benjamin was the son of Samuel Blankenkaker born 1754. All of Samuel's children and two wives are listed in the Lutheran Church record.

Jefferson County Kentucky tax lists show Samuel Blankenkaker being taxed as early as 1795. He had been earlier taxed in Madison and Bourbon Counties. He, his second wife, Mary Appalone Tare, married in Lincoln County Kentucky 1789, and Samuel's father, Jacob, with his second wife and infants as well as Samuel's two younger brothers, Henry and Thomas, and their families settled near Jeffersontown on a road to Middletown, still called Blankenkaker Road.

Along with this family group, other German families from the Hebron Lutheran Church of Madison County Virginia started the first German Lutheran settlement in Jefferson County Kentucky. These were joined by other German families from Pennsylvania and new arrivals to the United States from Germany, such as the Jacob Hummel family.

Jeffersontown is sometimes referred to in early records as Brunerstown. It was incorporated as JEFFERSONTOWN, and Samuel Blankenkaker was one of the original trustees in 1797. In Culpeper County Virginia there are numerous records of Blankenkakers, including the will of Samuel's grandfather, John Nicholas Blankenkaker,[†] the immigrant of 1717, and other Germanna settlers. There is also a town in the northeastern part of Culpeper County Virginia near the Fauquier County line, named Jeffersonton.

The first wife of Samuel Blankenkaker was "Eame" (Eva or Amy) Jager (Yeager). She and her family are noted numerous times in the Hebron Lutheran Church records, as well as many Blankenkakers and other families who settled in Jeffersontown, Ky.

That the Jeffersontown Lutheran Church was considered a part of the Hebron Lutheran Church shows in the "Centenary Celebration" planned in 1841, page 47 in this compilation. The extant Hebron Lutheran Church records began in 1750. Apparently no record remains of the earlier Lutheran Church of the people of Germanna, locating in Spottsylvania County Virginia, beginning 1714.

The Jeffersontown Lutheran Church records included, 1818 thru 1885, were kept in an overlapping disorder. In this compilation, entries are arranged chronologically and identified as, Book A, B, C and D. Lists of names are in alphabetical order with numbers indicating the original order.

Spellings of the original are used. Often the German speaking people with English as their second language, used P's and B's interchangeably, and used vowels as the writer chose, i.e., Bentz or Pence, Cunrod or Conrad, Avinger, Evinger; Tare probably should be Tyre.

The extant records of the Jeffersontown Lutheran Church began in the winter of 1818, a record kept by Rev. Henry A. Kurtz, designated in this transcription as Book A. The account record kept by Elder Samuel Blankenkaker started in the fall of 1819, Book B. The extant records start when a community church building, serving Baptist, Lutheran, Methodist and Presbyterian denominations, was built. That these various church groups were operating prior to 1818 is obvious from many other records. It seems likely that Rev. Henry Pottorf/Battorff served the early Lutherans of Jeffersontown and Middletown. He seems to have been the only minister in the early Jefferson County Marriage Records to have married many Lutherans. (He also had the interchangeable first consonant, P or B, starting his sur-name).

Rev. John Whitaker served as the first minister of the first Baptist Church, Bear Grass, west of Jeffersontown. Very likely he served the Jeffersontown people at Chenoweth Baptist and possibly in Jeffersontown from 1785 thru the early 1790's.

The Middletown Presbyterian's first recorded minister was Rev. James Vance, as early as 1795. He was one of the Trustees at the incorporation of Middletown in 1797. He served the Penn Run Presbyterian Church simultaneously and probably served a group of people in Jeffersontown. The First Presbyterian Church of Anchorage, the evolution of the Middletown Presbyterian Church, has records as early as 1836, I am told. The extant records of Middletown Presbyterian have been sent to Montreat, N.C. to the Presbyterian Archives. Portions of the early Penn Run records are in a private home.

No records of the early Methodist Church or it's minister survive.

The donation list of the Baptist, Presbyterian and Methodists made by Samuel Blankenkaker seems to be the only and earliest record of some of the members of these denominations, page 5 and 6 of this compilation, of Eastern Jefferson County.

Still living in the Jeffersontown area are descendants of these early German settlers, seven and eight generations later.

The immediately following pages describe the 1833 Lutheran church building. The bell was to be hung in the fall of 1840. Since Benjamin Blankenkaker was part of the bell committee, and he died in the fall of 1840, still a young man of 47, it can be pondered as to whether he died accidentally during the installation of said bell.

I know of no picture of the Lutheran Church built in 1833. Rev. George Yeager described the exterior and the interior design. From his outline, I sketched the church. The pointillism ink rendering of the sketch on the cover was done by the great, great, great, great grand-daughter of Samuel Blankenkaker, the youngest grandchild of Charlotte Blankenkaker Lovett, and youngest child of Charles Leslie Lovett Sr., Elizabeth Anne Vance Lovett, born 5 Feb 1963.

Besides Elizabeth, Charles Sr. is father of C. Leslie Lovett Jr. M.D., who has a son, James Leslie Lovett; and father of Victoria Vance Lovett Stone, who has a son, Charles Blain Stone. Charlotte's daughter, Frances Jean Lovett Darrell has three children, Don Allen Darrell, who has two sons, Jason and Jonathan; and a second son, David Darrell, and a daughter, Charlene Darrell. Charlotte's youngest son, Thomas Townsend Lovett, has three daughters, Colleen Townsend, Lisa Ann and Diana Carroll Lovett. Charlotte's only brother, Leslie A. Blankenkaker Jr. has no children. These then, are descendants of Samuel Blankenkaker through his great grandson, Dr. Leslie A. Blankenkaker (Sr).

A NEW CHURCH BUILDING

Book C, page 1. (In George Yeager's handwriting)

The following minutes were adopted at a meeting of the congregation that was held at the house of Mr. W. Cunrod early in the spring of 1833, March 7th.

We the members of the Evangelical Lutheran Congregation in and around Jeffersontown, Jefferson Co.^{ty} Ky. assembled together, according to a previous publick notice, for the purpose of considering and adopting measures for advancing the interests and prosperity of said congregation; do resolve that as the congregation is now destitute of any convenient or suitable place of worship, and that so long as it thus continues, incalculable disadvantages must be submitted to, we therefore, deem it a matter of the utmost importance to the congregation, that all it's members unite in making a speedy, and vigorous effort for the building of a suitable and convenient house of worship to belong to, and be entirely under the control of the congregation-

That for this purpose, a committee of three shall be appointed to raise money, materials and workmen, (such as will be requisite, besides the builders), by subscription, subject to the following provisions:-

1. Subscription of \$50.00, and upwards, may if desired by the subscriber, be taken on two equal payments; the first on demand, and the 2nd after one year's credit. But when this is the case, it must be thus noted on the subscription, otherwise, the whole will be on demand of all subscriptions (as) under \$50. shall be.

2. When materials are subscribed, the kind must be mentioned in the subscription, and the condition stipulated, that they are to be delivered by the subscriber on the ground where the church is to be built, on demand.

3. When work is subscribed, it must be mentioned in the subscription, of what sort, and to be performed whenever called for -

4. The Committee shall exert themselves to collect the money, secure the delivery of the materials, and the performance of the work subscribed, but no compulsive measures be resorted to, in case of difficulty, without first receiving further instructions from the congregation so to do. The money they receive, they shall dispose of according to the directions herein after given, and render a true account so the congregation, at a meeting that shall be discharged on them, whether in money, materials, or work;- how much money they have in hand, and how much they have applied according to the directions of the Congregation, and the subscriptions and money shall then be delivered, to be disposed of, according to the pleasure of the congregation. So soon as \$700. in money shall have been, either paid into the hands of the collecting committee, or subscribed by such persons, as in their judgement, will render it perfectly secure, the building shall go on.

The house shall be built, after the following manner:-

It's dimensions shall be, - 45 ft. in length, and 40 ft. in breadth, and in height, sufficient to leave a space of 15 ft. between the floor and ceiling.

The foundation shall be of stone, to the height of 12 inches above the surface of the ground around the building; and that above the surface, compacted with strong mortar, made of lime and sand -

The wall of the super structure, shall be 13 inches thick, composed of brick materials, consolidated and cemented together with good mortar, composed of lime and sand. The wall shall be pointed on the outside, and plastered on the inside; and the house shall also be seiled.

On each side of the house, their shall be three windows of 24 panes, of 10 by 12 inch glass each. There shall be one door, in the front end of the pulpit, in the opposite end; and on either side of the pulpit, there shall be a window, as also on either side of the door, equal in size with those in the sides of the building. Immediately above the door there shall be a D window, with a diameter, of about 42 inches. On the inside, above the door, there shall be a gallery, inclining towards the pulpit, supported in front, by two posts, one on either side of the isle.

This shall be wide enough for 4 rows of seats, and immediately beneath it, the stairs shall go up on the right hand side on entering the door.

In the whole building there shall be a constant reference to convenience, durability, utility, neatness and plainness. All kind of unnecessary splendor, show and ornament shall be avoided.

The roof shall be made of pine shingles, - the cornice and all the other casing shall be plain. The pews shall be so arranged as to furnish as many seats as possible, with as little encumbrance and inconvenience as may be; They shall be made neat but plain, and under them, the floor shall be of plank; - along the aisle however, it shall be of brick. The pulpit shall be a platform, elevated about 4 ft. and of a semicircular form; but extending along the wall about 6 ft. and projecting from it, the door, about 5 ft. It shall be enclosed with plain wooden pailing, and when facing it, on the right hand side, the stairs shall ascend into it.

That a committee of two be appointed, to superintend the building, agreeably to the following provisions and limitations.

They shall be authorized to furnish all the materials for the building upon the ground, such as timber, plank, shingles, nails, hinges, windowglass, brick, stone, lime, sand &c. They shall also secure hands to tend upon the builders, where it will be necessary - and also secure for them and all such hands and builders working for the congregation, as will require it, suitable boarding.

To enable this committee to do these things on the most reasonable terms possible, all the members of the congregation shall feel themselves under obligations to render them all the assistance they can - Those who have teams shall do the haling, and those who can work shall lend their assistance. and the committee shall be authorized to call upon them for the purpose. But if the members of the congregation fail in furnishing a sufficient number of teams to do the hauling and hands to do the work, then the committee shall be at liberty to make contracts and employ teams and hands, wherever they can get them, but always on terms the most advantageous possible to the congregation.

For further enabling this committee to accomplish the above: the committee of three to raise subscriptions, shall secure the delivery of the material they got subscribed, and also the accomplishment of the work subscribed and pay over into their hands such amount of money as will enable them to meet the expenses which they will necessarily have to incur, - and they shall defray all debts which they may contract under this authority except what is herein after provided for.

They shall employ the builders, but pay them no money until ordered by the congregation to do so.

They shall see that the above plan of the building is strictly adhered to.

When the whole is finished, they shall render an accurate account to the congregation, at a meeting appointed for the purpose.

When the work is finished it shall be submitted to a joint committee of three, to be elected, one by the congregation, one by the superintendents and one by the builders; and by them the work shall be judged of, and for all its defects, they shall determine what allowance must be made on the part of the builders, and then the congregation shall give orders for the payment of what is justly due them.

After this, a meeting of the congregation shall be held for the purpose of setting up accounts with this collecting and superintending committee and discharging them from duty.

After the above resolutions were passed the following persons were appointed the collecting committee: Messrs. DAVID ETLEY BENJAMIN BLANKENBEKER SAMUEL CUNRAD. By a vote it was determined to postpone the appointment of the superintending committee until a future meeting of the congregation.

In the beginning of the meeting the subject was discussed - "Where the house should be built". On taking the vote by ballot, it was found that Jefferson-town was the place determined on.

In reference to the brick church in Jeffersontown, it was resolved that we appoint Saturday the 30th of March 1833 to be the day when we will meet all the

members of the other denominations who may choose to meet us at the church, who are concerned in it, for the purpose of determining what shall be done with it.

To have this made as publick as possible, Mr. W. CUNROD was appointed to have it published in all the different meetings in town, and the pastor of the congregation was directed to write several advertisements and have them put up at several publick places in the neighborhood of the church. After the above transacting, the meeting adjourned.

Book C, bottom of page 5.

On Sunday the 31st of March 1833, a meeting was held (after the preaching) for the purpose of electing such officers as the wants of the congregation then required. The former trustees of the old church, Mr. AUGUSTUS FREDERICK being deceased, and Mr. PETER YENAWINE signified his determination to resign. The congregation elected in their room: Messers PHILIP BENTZ Jr and DAVID ETLEY and authorized them to endeavor in the name of the Evangelical Lutheran Congregation, whose interest in that church they are to represent and advocate to have, if possible, that church disposed of; and have all just claims, discharges and the remainder of the money equally divided between the several congregations interested in it. The congregation also elected Messers. BENJAMIN BLANKENBEKER and WILLIAM GOOSE to be the trustees of the church that the congregation is about to build, and authorized them to purchase the three lots immediately join the graveyard on the North side, and the Middletown street on the North West side; and procure a deed for them in their own names, and those of their successors, (whoever they may be) in trust for the congregation by whom they were appointed. After which, the meeting adjourned.

Page 6.

On Sunday the 14th of April 1833, a meeting was held, after preaching, for the purpose of electing the Superintendents of the building of the new church, and upon motion, the vote was taken and Messers VALENTINE CUNROD and JOHN YENAWINE were appointed, and the meeting was adjourned.

Sunday April 28th 1833; the congregation held a meeting, after preaching, for the purpose of considering some matters relative to the building of the new church, when it was resolved:

That part of the plan now adopted, requiring the house to be 40 ft. in breadth, be altered to 30 ft. in breadth.

That instead of only three windows on either side of the house, there shall be one additional small one of 12 panes above the Gallery.

That besides the D window above the door, which shall center into the loft of the building, there shall be three other windows of about 12 panes each in the gallery in the front end, and those on either side of the door shall be only of the same size. After this, the meeting was adjourned.

Page 7.

A copy of the contract with the brick layer -
Jefferson County Kentucky April 29th 1833.

We, VALENTINE CUNROD and JOHN YENAWINE, Superintendants of the building of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jeffersontown, do hereby agree according to the authority vested in us by the Congregation, and subject to it's orders, to pay to Mr. REUBEN ROSS, living in Oldham Co., Ky., the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars, in lawful money, in view of and upon the condition and consideration of his agreeing to, and fulfilling the following condition: -

The timber shall be found him for the burning of the brick, but he shall cut and hall the wood.

He shall furnish all the sand for moulding of the bricks, and the building of the house, and hall it to the grounds.

He shall moak and burn the bricks; but the boards to make the shef for drying shall be furnished him.

He shall furnish, quarry and hall the rock for the foundation; he shall also have the foundation walls put up in the following manner:- it shall be 30 inches

in height, and according to the plan of the congregation, he shall also do the excavating for the foundation; there shall be two middle walls through the house. The wall shall be 20 inches thick.

He shall put up the brick work of the house according to the plan now adopted by the congregation.

He shall find his own tenders, but for the mortar, the lime shall be furnished by the congregation.

He shall make a brick cornice to the house. He shall also lay the bricks in the isle through the house -

Should the said Mr. ROSS die in the meantime, he shall be released from this obligation, but his heirs shall receive for the work he has done, a just proportion of the money that is to be paid for the doing of the whole. The money shall be paid him on the completion of the work.

VALENTINE CONRAD and JOHANN YENWIGAIN

We, or either of us, hereby agree to the above conditions. To have the work completed in the manner specified, in consideration of the three hundred and fifty dollars, agreed to be paid to us therefore, in lawful money, by the said superintendents, Messers VALENTINE CUNROD and JOHN YENAWINE ----

REUBEN ROSS and FREDERICK YENAWINE

Page 9 A copy of the contract with the carpenter -

We the superintendants of the building of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jeffersontown, Jefferson County Kentucky do hereby agree and promise to pay, subject to the article adopted by the congregation, under whose authority we herein act, relating hereto, to MICHAEL DOUBT and SAMUEL NEWKIRK, the sum of two hundred and seventy-five dollars, in lawful money, upon condition that, and in consideration of, their agreeing to and fulfilling the following agreement:

That they do the following carpentry work, belonging to the house:

They shall make, (all the materials being found (by) them)

Nine, fifteen light windows of 10 by 12 inch panes

Three, twelve light windows of 10 by 12 inch panes

One folding door.

One D window.

Thirty-six seats, similar to those in the old church.

Twelve pair of batten shutters.

Four benches for the gallery - to be the whole length.

The lower floor arched and matched

The gallery floor - to be rough.

The gallery stairs, plain and neat - hand rail and banisters.

Framing the rafters and shingling the roof.

The house to be 45 ft. by 30 ft.

Plain washboards. The work shall be done plain, but neat -

This Indenture, made 26 Aug 1819, between PHILIP ZILHART & PEGGY his wife of Jefferson County Kentucky...of the one part and the following gentlemen, appointed as trustees for their respective congregations for the Jeffersontown Church: To Wit, HENRY F KALFUS and WILLIAM MILLS for the Presbyterian, PETER YENAWINE and JOHN MILLER for the Lutheran, MICHAEL MILLER and PHILIP WEINAND for the Methodist and GEORGE HIKES Sen^r and EDWARD TYLER Sen^r for the Baptist congregations of the other part"...for \$35..."all that certain lot of ground situate, lying, and being in Jeffersontown on the South East side of Main Street, and known on the map, or platt of said town by number 35, containing in front of said street 66 feet, and in depth, 200 feet..." (warrant to the) ..."trustees for their respective congregations, and their successors"...for the exclusive right and privilege of the use of the German and English Presbyterian, German and English Lutheran, German and English Methodist, and German and English Baptist societies and to prevent any disagreeable occurrences which might arise from so many societies uniting in building a house for their publick worship"...have made the following regulations to divide the weeks, in every month for those of the said house for every society, to wit, First the German and English Presbyterians shall be entitled to the use of the said church to perform their religious worship from the first Thursday and the six following days in every month"...German and English Lutheran...second Thursday and the six following days...German and English Methodist...third Thursday and the six following days...German and English Baptist...fourth Thursday and the six following days...when...not occupied...it shall be free...for any religious societies. For this purpose the within named trustees...shall appoint one discreet person...who shall keep the Keys of the Church and open the Door to any preacher of the Gospel, when not occupied by either of the before named societies, And the said trustees, and their successors shall have full power & authority on the part and in behalf of each of their respective societies to fill any vacancies that may happen, either by death or resignation of any of the present trustees or their successors. And the within named trustees for themselves and their respective societies, covenant and agree that the foregoing herein recited regulations shall be punctually and perpetually observed by every society privileged to make use of the said church for their religious worship, and that no alteration shall be made in the said regulations without the consent and approbation of all the trustees of every society. In witness whereof the said parties to these presents have hereunto set their hands & seals the day & year within written".

p. 29 Jan^y the 9th 1821...the Rev^d HENRY A KURTZ returned from Harrisburg Pa to my house in Jefferson County Ky. On the 12th day I went to Frederick Yenawine to consult him about making up a Salary for said Kurtz. At the same time I proposed to said Yenawine and asked him if it would not be good policy to try and get an Elder and warden elected in favour of the Lutheran Church. I nominated GEO K POMEROY as Elder and JOHN HOWARD as Warden which -was agreed to by said Yenawine, and after I came home I told Mr Kurtz of what we had agreed on and he appeared to be well satisfy'd.

On the 11th of Feb^y the Rev^d JACOB ZINK gave public notice on the pulpit that there would be an election held on the 11th of March for one Elder and one Warden, whereupon RICHARD C ANDERSON had 10 votes for Elder; GEO K POMEROY had 8 votes for Elder. JOHN HOWARD had 18 votes for Warden. Rich^d C Anderson and John Howard were duly inaugurated and received the right hand of fellowship & brotherly love in presence of a large congregation.

pp. 30-34 Whereas on Monday the 2^d day of July 1821 the Rev HENRY A KURTZ started from the house of Mr. JOHN WEISEHART, Nelson County, in company with Mr. GEORGE WEISEHART for Jefferson County to the house of SAM^l BLANKENBEKER where he, s^d KURTZ has his boarding, a distance of about 26 miles. It being a very wet, showery day, and the s^d Mr. KURTZ having no grate coat, they traveled on to Mount Vernon* where Mr. KURTZ was invited to come in a house by Mr. WIGGENTON who got about a gil of Whiskey on the table and they, KURTZ and WEISEHART, took each of them a small drink. And now they have traveled about 13 miles and they pass on under heavy Showers of rain and came to one Mr. GEOBIN, within one and a half miles of Jeffersontown. Here they stopt and have traveled again about 9 miles and Mr. KURTZ, as wet as water could make him by heavy showers and having no grate coat on, and they both took a reasonable drink or two, and passed on about a half mile and parted. Mr. WEISEHART traveled toward Shelby (Co.) and Mr. KURTZ toward Jeffersontown, which was about one mile to s^d town from the place they parted, and when Mr. KURTZ passed thru said town, there was 12 or 15 men in Mr. BROWN's porch (a tavern or public house). Several of those men reported that Mr. KURTZ was intoxicated; however he passed on 2¹/₂ miles to s^d BLANKENBEKERS' where his family had no thought of his being intoxicated. But the talk of intoxication spred and increased very fast; the next morning one Mrs. BARBARA MYERS started to Middletown and there circulated the same very fast, so that on the 4th instant, the news came to s^d KURTZ and he requested that the Church Council should be called to have a fair investigation concerning said charge, which was done and Council convened on the 6th instant in the Brick Church in Jeffersontown, and all their evidence could say against Mr. KURTZ, was that he looked like he was intoxicated and that they thought so - On such evidence Mr. KURTZ (could) have been requited but he rather insisted that the Council should here the evidence of GEORGE WEISEHART who traveled with him on s^d 2nd day of July and it was agreed to. WEISEHART's evidence was heard by the Council on the 26th instant and made report as follows. To the above trial, present:

NICHOLAS GAAR, BENJAMIN BLANKENBEKER

Jefferson County, Jeffersontown - July 26th day 1821

A majority of the Council of the Evangelical Lutheran Church, having convened in the Church in the town aforesaid on the day for the purpose of determining upon the case of the Rev^d Mr. HENRY A KURTZ, having the satisfaction to state that after haveing heard (this day) from Mr. GEORGE WEISEHART personally at this place; that on Monday the 2^d instant, he rode in company with the said Mr. KURTZ from about five miles on this side of Bardstown nearly to this town, that he, the said Mr. KURTZ, is entirely innocent of the charges of intoxication alleged against him by some of his acquaintances then in this town as he on the same day passed thru it, that he, Mr. WEISEHART, is clearly and decidedly of the opinion that Mr. KURTZ was guilty of NO kind of intemperance during their journeying together, and that he has no hesitation saying that his acquaintances in this town have formed a mistaken opinion against him. We the Church Council, hereafter named, do therefore again pronounce the said Mr. KURTZ to be entirely innocent as aforesaid and request Mr. SAM^l BLANKENBEKER to enter the same in the records of this Church. Witness our hands, date within written.

p. 35-36 Having heard with much surprise that the Reverend Henry A Kurtz has been charged with intoxication and that he was seen so in the house of my Father, in this place. I think it but Justice to state that wherever I have seen Mr. Kurtz, I have always found him entirely temperate and have always found his conduct consistent with the station which he fills in Society. I believe him to be as a Minister of the Gospel, a useful man and as a private gentleman, moral and polite. I was here at the time he is said to have been intoxicated, and insisted upon his dismounting, to which he rather reluctantly consented, saying that time was precious with him having an appointment to meet on that evening. Upon his entering the house, my mother brought in about a gill of whiskey, of which Mr Kurtz, young Mr. Weis- hart and myself all took one moderate drink, so moderate that nearly half of it was left. I was on that day the only male member of my fathers family in the house. To the foregoing statement, I am willing to swear.

On Sunday the 22nd of September 1822 there was a collection held in the house of Mr. Valentine Cunrod of Jefferson County to raise money to pay the Rev^d PHILIP HENKEL for preaching two sermons on said day. Whereupon there was a small sum of three dollars, eighty-seven and a half cents collected for said Henkle and delivered to him by FREDERICK YENEWINE.

1823

On Sunday Jan^y 19: 1823 The Church Council of Jeffersontown congregation met in the house of Sam^l Blankenbeker to give an answer to a letter that came from Nelson County, signed by LEONARD STREIT & GEORGE MATHIS and to determine where the Conference of the Lutheran Synod is to be held, whether in Jefferson or Nelson County. SAMUEL BLANKENBEKER, VALENTINE CUNROD & NICHOLAS GAAR voted or agreed for the Session to be held in Nelson County, HARRISONS Church, and BENJAMIN BLANKENBEKER agreed for s^d Session to be held in Jeffersontown on the third Sunday in June 1823. (Signed)

SAM^l BLANKENBEKER - VALENTINE CUNROD - NICHOLAS GAAR - BEN BLANKENBEKER

On Friday the 20th of June 1823 the Rev^d DAVID HENKLE preached a lengthy and most excellent gospel sermon and then on Wednesday following the 25th day of said month, Mr. LEWIS MARKERT preacht a sermon in the German language and Mr. JACOB HENKLE preacht a sermon at 2 O Clock in the English language the same day. Whereupon there was a collection held to raise some money for the above named preachers. When there was laid on \$7.75 in specie and \$10.12¹/₂ in paper money, in all, Seventeen Dollars, eighty seven and half cents, for the three preachers and was delivered into the hands of Rev^d DAVID HENKEL by Mr. AUGUSTUS FREDERICK. The above preaching was in Jeffersontown, Jefferson County.

pp. 39-41 WHEREAS I, SAM^l BLANKENBEKER, being elected the 7th day of Feb^y 1819 as Elder to the Congregation of Jeffersontown and I serv^d in that office to the best of my skill and knowledge, which I think the Church Wardens and the greater part of the Congregation can testify, but in the year 1822, I was in Nelson County and in HARRISON'S Church where I was asked by the Rev^d PHILIP HENKEL to sign a petition to send to the Tennessee Synod, praying for that Synod to send a few of their clergy men to Kentucky to hold a Session for the benefit of the Lutheran Churches, which petition I did cheerfully sign. And when this petition was laid before the Synod of Tennessee, it was granted and that a Session should be held in Jeffersontown, Kentucky on the third Sunday in June 1823, which third Sunday in June, the Brick Church in Jeffersontown did not belong to the Lutherans, but did belong to the Meth- odists. Now let the whole world take notice, or as many as it may concern, that there was a letter sent to me and now in my possession, that our Church Council should determine where the above Session should be held. Whether in Nelson or in Jefferson County and as the Nelson Congregation had a Church which was always ready and would be opened for every good purpose, myself, VALENTINE CONRAD, and NICHOLAS GAAR voted for the Session to be held in Nelson County, Harrison's Church, and BENJAMIN BLANKENBEKER* was for the Session to be held in Jeffersontown. Now take notice, the above Session was held in Nelson County the third Sunday of June 1823 and the three following days. And by the request of the Rev^d JACOB ZINK, there was also a Session appointed to be held in Jeffersontown on Friday the 20th of said June, and the congregation met and preaching was performed, but no other business was done. And on said day I heard that I was charged with acting improper by giveing my vote as Nelson County. Whereupon I sent Mr. AUGUST FREDERICK and Mr. PETER YENAWINE word to come to Jeffersontown where there wa s preaching again by three Clergymen on the 25th of said June, so that I would make my defence and clear myself of the unjust charge. They, FREDERICK and YENAWINE, both came, but three lengthy sermons being delivered, it became very late, so that I had no time to make my defence, and on the 24th of July 1823, ELIAS CHRISTLER, came to my house, who was one of my accusers. When I demanded him to bring me to trial and give me a chance to make my defence, but this was not done. Therefore and on account of the above unjust charges, I do hereby resign my office as Elder of the Lutheran Congregation of Jeffersontown, and I do recommend Co^l FREDERICK GEIGER to be elected in my place as a proper man and a great patron of our church. Given under my hand this 10th day of Nov 1823.

Wo is me for my hurt; my wound is grievous; but I said truly this is a grief, and I must bear it. Jeremiah, the 10th and 19th verse-

The minutes of the meeting held at W^m Conrad's house 7 Mar 1833 were adopted.

"We the members of the Evangelical Lutheran Congregation in and around Jeffersontown, Jefferson County, Ky., assembled together...for the purpose of considering and adopting measures for advancing the interests and prosperity of said congregation, do resolve that as the congregation is now destitute of any convenient or suitable place of worship...deem it a matter of utmost importance...that all it's members unite in making a speedy and vigorous effort for the building of a suitable and convenient house of worship to belong to us", and to be under the control of the congregation. Jeffersontown was chosen for the location.

Resolutions and specifications, describing the building are enumerated on pages one thru four, were passed by the Council to be presented to the Congregation.

A "Collecting Committee" was appointed:

DAVID ETLEY, BENJAMIN BLANKENBEKER and SAMUEL CONRAD

Mr W CONRAD to 'publish' a meeting, 30 Mar 1833, to determine what to do with the 'brick church' (that all denominations had used).

p. 5 31 Mar 1833, a congregational meeting was held "after the preaching" for electing officers of the Church Council. Former trustees:

AUGUSTUS FREDERICK was now deceased; PETER YENAWINE was determined to resign.

This congregation retain Trustees, their number be four, two of Jeffersontown Church, two of Christ Church and their term be two years unless re-elected.
- 3 In connection with the Elders and Deacons, the Trustees be subject to the restrictions of Chap 7, Sec 4 of the formula.
- 4 The bi-annual election for members of Council, be on New Year's day.
- 5 The present Council and Trustees to serve until next Christmas day, then a new election shall take place.
- 6 The Council be authorized to employ a suitable person to open and close, make fire in, sweep, and when necessary scrub out Christ's Church.
- 7 In time of worship, silence shall be observed by the congregation as far as possible; that it be recommended to all, not to go out during divine service, without some urgent and imperative necessity; and to the Council, not to suffer the devotions of any to be disturbed by the noise and confusion of persons moving about in the house; and on sacramental occasions, to see that all the communicants are accommodated with front seats...
- 8 It is the duty of the Trustees of this congregation to hold in their names and transact all business relative to the specific portions of real estate, which the congregation has already given, or may hereafter give them in trust; or for which under the authority of the congregation, they have already contracted or may hereafter contract.

Business relative to the Jeffersontown Church was deferred to Christmas day meeting. Resolved that the formula as now amended shall be the system of government in the congregation...meeting now adjourned.

p. 81 11 Nov 1838 Congregational meeting:

Resolved that on Saturday next at 10 o'clock, a meeting be held for the transaction of important business belonging to the congregation.

Resolved that Messers W^T GOOSE & SAM^l NEWKIRK be a committee to notify such members as may be guilty of delinquency, immoral, or un-Christian conduct to attend, to answer to the charges preferred against them.

p. 81 11 Nov 1838 (continued)

Resolved that Messers BENJ BLANKENBEKER, JACOB REEL & JACOB HOKE Ju be a committee to report on the church, and the best method of promoting a more lively and encouraging state of things in religion.

Saturday 17 Nov 1838 Congregation meeting opened with prayer.

The committee to whom was assigned inquiry into the causes of the present state of things in the church, submitted the following report:

Members of the congregation have not sufficiently felt the high responsibilities which their profession places them under.

They have not been so zealous in the practice of Christian duties as they should have been.

p. 82 Some members, and some professing to be Lutherans but not members, have been guilty of gross offences against morality and exerted influence in society repugnant to the interests of the congregation.

Some persons have entertained without just or reasonable grounds, have restrained such persons from giving full, hearty and undivided support to efforts made for the good of the congregation.

The cause itself, not being sufficiently dear to some members, they have neglected to labor and to pray for it, and have allowed themselves to think lightly of it, and sometimes to speak against it.

Through these various opposing causes, the congregation has suffered much, and the efforts of the pastor and real friends of the cause have been vastly paralyzed. To counteract these matters most effectually, the committee would recommend that the following resolutions be adopted and put into practice.

Resolved

"that besides the ordinary list of communicants, a list of all the members of the congregation be kept, and that this list be regularly read in the publick congregation once in three months, and when persons are admitted to membership in the congregation, their names shall be enrolled on this list.

p. 83 When persons die, who are members, their names shall be erased from the list. So also, if they become immoral or heretical, and are excommunicated. If persons withdraw from the congregation, or remove out of its bounds while in good standing, they must be given a certificate of good standing, and to neglect to call for such a certificate must be regarded as indictive of fear and a dispoition to elude justice, and their names shall be erased.

Resolved

"that every member of this congregation be in duty bound to examine his or her heart daily, in view of all the Christian duties laid down in the New Testament, and to endeavor by all means to conform to them and to supplicate the divine favor towards the church.

Resolved

"that prayer meeting be held weekly in the evenings, either in the church or at some private house, and for this purpose, lighting be made for the church.

Resolved

"that every parent feel it to be his consciencious duty to administer religious instruction to his children, and when they are of sufficient age, to see that they are instructed by the pastor.

Resolved

"that the old custom adoped by our old Lutheran father, of paying pastoral visits, be adopted, and that these visits be as frequently attended to as may be suitable to the convenience of the pastor; that these visits shall

not be merely social, but religion shall be the object sought to be promoted, and it shall be the duty of one or more of the officers of the congregation to accompany the pastor when he so desires.

Resolved

"that when members attend publick worship they shall be expected to p. 84 take their seats in the church immediately on their arrival there, and when in the church they shall manifest seriousness of deportment, and shall not (except in cases of necessity) go out during divine service.

Upon consideration by the congregation, the report was adopted in its entirety.

A number of persons had been notified to attend this session by the 1st committee. The following procedure took place:

Resolved

"that we do not consider Mr THOS BLANKENBEKER as a member of this congregation, and as he has failed to attend this meeting, we would never the less express our sentiment that he (at present) is unworthy of the name of a Lutheran, which he assumes.

Resolved p. 85

"that JAS BLANKENBEKER (as he is at present), we are in conscience bound to withdraw from him all communion privilages and to regard him as unworthy of the name of a Lutheran.

Resolved

"that GOTTFRIED SCHEIERLY is unworthy of the name of a Lutheran and that (until he amends his life) we cannot extend communing privilages to him.

Resolved

"that PHILIP ZILHART Sr is unworthy of the name of a Lutheran, and we cannot regard him as a member or extend communing privileges to him.

Resolved

"that JACOB HUNTSINGER Sr is not a Lutheran, and ought not to call himself by that name!

Resolved

"that JACOB LEATHERMAN cannot be considered a member as long as he continues his present course of action and deportment.

PHILIP BENTZ particularly requested that nothing be done in his case until the difficulties between him & his father in law and family are adjusted; and requested that one or two persons might be appointed for the purpose of arranging that matter, it was resolved that JACOB BLANKENBEKER & GEO DARR be appointed to attend to the difficulties between Mr BENTZ and his father in law and family to endeavor to accomplish an adjustment of them.

To the members and Pastor of the Church at Jeffersontown:

We the undersigned, for two or three years experience, do most solemnly remonstrate against the aforesaid GEORGE YEAGER's practices in conducting the church government or doctrine to be contrary to that which we have subscribed ourselves. So firmly convinced, that by these presence, we do withdraw from said GEORGE YEAGER and do farther renounce and disclaim every By-Law enacted by said church or GEORGE YEAGER, that we will acknowledge no By-Laws save that of Jesus Christ and the Apostles, no man to be our 'judge', but as Paul said, "Let a man examine himself whether he is in the faith or not".

In witness of our withdrawal, we have here unto, set our hands, each and everyone, for himself, this 15th day of January 1839.

Book A Summary of GEORGE YEAGER vs. CHRIST'S Evangelical Lutheran Church 1842-1846

p. 78 - 92 By a resolution of the Church Council, 23 Jan 1846:

Upon GEORGE YEAGER's return from Indianapolis in Oct 1843, he announced from the pulpit that he had been appointed Editor and Agent (of the Lutheran Observer).

He announced that Mr. McCHESENEY had been procured as Pastor, but before he arrived, GEORGE YEAGER rented his school room to Mr. FOWLER, a teacher. Another teacher who also wished to open a school, Mr. POEL, became a partner of Mr. FOWLER, with the consent of G. YEAGER. The school started in the spring of 1843.

GEORGE YEAGER became dissatisfied with the teachers and scholars, and he determined to repossess his school room before the teachers time was up (one school year?) He, astride his horse and enroute to preach at Pope Lick one Sabbath morning, called upon W^m GOOSE before the gate of the church, telling him to come on Monday morning to help him repossess his house. W^m GOOSE advised him not to do so, that he may get into difficulties, but he feared no danger.

On the following Monday, he removed the contents belonging to the teachers and students from the building, and nailed the doors "fast". Having heard the gossip forecasting the encounter, numerous citizens came to watch the confrontation.

The teachers demanded that the doors be opened but GEORGE YEAGER refused. One of the teachers got a "billet of wood" with which to force the door, and GEORGE YEAGER "ran into his house to get a gun". Mrs. YEAGER, being unwell and in feeble health, "caught a hold" of her husband and pleaded with him to put down the gun. He consented, but when released, picked up his gun and ran out, declaring he would shoot Mr. POEL. One of the bystanders took the loaded gun from him, and the teachers took possession of the room and resumed teaching. GEORGE YEAGER justified himself by saying that he had done no more than George Washington had done in taking up arms to defend his rights.

GEORGE YEAGER had said that he would preach until Mr McCHESENEY arrived. Due to the excitement from the school room affair, the Council thought that he should not preach. After consultation, Mr. MATHEIS, GEORGE YEAGER's father-in-law, and SAMUEL NEWKIRK, two of the Council members, informed him that the Council did not want him to preach.

In June 1843, Mr McCHESENEY took charge and the church prospered. GEORGE YEAGER remained distant and sat in the back of the church at public preaching. At the close of Mr. McCHESENEY's administration, the Council discussed refilling the pulpit. Mr. MATHEIS thought GEORGE YEAGER expected to once again take charge, but the Council was opposed and so "it was the opinion of all the congregation".

Mr. MATHEIS and JACOB HOKE were appointed to "wait upon" Mr. YEAGER, (Mr. MATHEIS had W^m CUTTER substitute for him) to inform him of the resolution and suggest that he preach elsewhere. After GEORGE YEAGER refused, the whole Council called upon him at his house. He appeared to be unwell, but gave a "severe lecture" in a "very unchristian and ungentlemanly manner", saying the action was wrong and injurious to the church. He said Mr. McCHESENEY could not legally hold an election for a successor, but agreed that the Council could request him to do so; but all the congregation, including the females, had a right to vote.

The congregation met and a committee of four was appointed to obtain consent of candidates for the pulpit. Shortly thereafter, they reported that P. GLENN had agreed to be a candidate. GEORGE YEAGER was asked if he wished to be a candidate; he gave the committee no satisfaction, but said if even he would and be elected, it depended on circumstances as to whether he would preach, and asked to explain, he did not. The committee did not feel at liberty to report him as a candidate. Bro. GLENN was elected unanimously. After the election, GEORGE YEAGER inferred that the election was unconstitutional, and that the females should vote and that GLENN must be elected by 2/3 of all members; but it was impossible to get all the members together at one time to vote. The Council considered the constitution to mean, "all members present".

GEORGE YEAGER circulated falsehoods; "for instance, when the before named committee advised him to preach elsewhere, he said the committee had ordered him out of his house which was indeed not so". Some of the members living on Pope Lick backed him.

He told us he was not our Pastor, and if he had any responsibility, it was with a higher tribunal.

The Council became weary and hoped that the Synod at Knightstown (Ind.) would take notice of their plight, but they did not. At the Synod in Boone, Co., Ky. in 1843, the pulpit was vacant. The Council drew up charges against GEORGE YEAGER and appointed JOHN YENAWINE, FREDERICK YENAWINE and W^m GOOSE to go to the Synod convention. The papers were given to a committee who selected OLMSTEAD, GLENN and STREIT to go to Jeffersontown and investigate the difficulties. GEORGE YEAGER spoke out and said he would have nothing to do with it.

The Council heard that the committee dissolved before Synod closed. GEORGE YEAGER then boasted that Synod took no notice of it and told GEORGE B YENAWINE that he had brought the Council papers home with him, and wished to publish them in the 'Observer' but was advised not to do so. The Council understood that Rev^d TRIMPER would go to Louisville and Jeffersontown, to labor, but GEORGE YEAGER said he had lost confidence in him and the Council need not look for him.

In the fall of 1845, Rev^d D. STRINGER told FREDERICK YENAWINE Sr that Rev^d TRIMPER had received a letter from GEORGE YEAGER saying all was well and he was again Pastor. The same was related to WILLIAM GOOSE by D. SHEARER.

GEORGE YEAGER had a meeting of five or six men at his house to transact business for the church and they appointed JACOB REEL, JACOB BLANKENBEKER and his son JOHN, to demand a key from the sexton. The sexton refused without the consent of the Council, who refused. GEORGE YEAGER made an appointment at Pope Lick to preach in Christ Church the following Sabbath, at which time his committee and Mr YEAGER appeared, he with a law book under his arm. Prayer meeting was dismissed and GEORGE YEAGER arose and asked if they would comply with his committee's request, and if not, (he held up the law book) "they" would put the law in force. This was contrary to the discipline. The congregation left and went to the other church to the 11 o'clock preaching, and GEORGE YEAGER followed. The Bro. Methodist dismissed his congregation. GEORGE YEAGER announced that he would preach at 2 P.M. in the Brick Church. The sexton was advised not to lock the door; GEORGE YEAGER preached to a small group and said he was once again going to preach, and if those (opposing him) wished to join him, all would be well and good, otherwise, they would not be considered members. He threatened them with the law (of the church).

The Council wrote a letter to the President (of the Synod), N.B. LITTLE, asking for advice and telling him of the boasting of GEORGE YEAGER, but the Synod took no notice. President N.B. LITTLE replied that GEORGE YEAGER did not tell a lie; that no charge was brought against him; that a committee had investigated.

The Council once again drew up charges against GEORGE YEAGER and sent them to Synod at Fort Wayne, Ind., but as Synod was not in session, action was not taken.

In April last, J. KRACK took charge and GEORGE YEAGER continued to perform ministerial duties within the congregational bounds. The families backing him were: JACOB REEL and family; JACOB BLANKENBEKER and family, two sons and sons-in-law with their families, MICHAEL DERR and family and two sisters and JACOB POTTS and wife, organized at Pope Lick (apparently the beginning of Mt. Zion).

Council again reported to Synod at Mt. Carmell, Ill., having withdrawn membership from the Synod of the West, losing all confidence in them. The Council found that \$18. had not been paid to Synod as had been reported. GEORGE YEAGER had told SAMUEL NEWKIRK the year the Synod was at Corydon, Ind., that he had thought the year before in Tennessee that the Synod of the West would dissolve.

In the fall of 1844, the door latch of the church was removed for several weeks by JACOB and JOHN LEATHERMAN to obtain a key, and then replaced. JOHN LEATHERMAN was an Elder in the Presbyterian Cumberland Church. He and his brother had a lawsuit and told on one another. Both are friends of GEORGE YEAGER.

JACOB REEL, a Pope Lick member, wanted to fight with an Elder of Christ Lutheran Church.

The wife of GEORGE YEAGER died 6 June last and he is to be married again "on this day, 29 Jan 1846, to Miss MARY HOKE, daughter of ANDREW HOKE. A Camellite Esq. and preacher is to perform", &c. (Not signed).
